Closing out our 89th season, we celebrate great singing, a world premiere, French and Italian romances, and a breakout performance by a Baumgartner Studio Artist in *Barber of Seville*. Prepare for a wild ride through The Florentine's escapades of the year!



Roméo et Juliette brought out not just the opera enthusiasts but also folks from the Met, Chicago Lyric, and Houston. Yes, they are stalking our cast like opera paparazzi. You can't blame them with rising stars strutting their stuff on our stage!

Did we mention that we maintained a balanced budget despite all the dramatic shenanigans? Juggling divas and cash reserves all at once — a true performance art in itself! And let's not forget our creative teams, as diverse as the notes on a musical score. We proudly celebrate a season built with 23% people of color and 48% women/nonbinary. It's not just about the art; it's about sharing perspectives, baby!

Now, for the pièce de résistance—our education programs. This year, we impacted a whopping 77,792 students, and that's not a typo. We broke opera down to its bare essentials for Penfield's students—Opera 101 with costumes, singing, movement, art, and more—talk about immersive learning! In our quest to bring opera to Milwaukee's youth, we didn't just stop at school visits. Schools on Stage featured Pathways High School, in costume at center stage.

But wait, there's more! We took a break from singing for a strategic retreat—like the opera version of a corporate getaway, but more drama and fewer trust falls. And guess what? We even refreshed our marketing strategy and introduced flex subscriptions. Because when it comes to opera, we like to keep it flexible, just like our sopranos hitting those high notes.

Last but not least, our ticket accounts saw an influx of 54% newcomers and a 10.4% increase in tickets purchased. We've got a whole army of newbies joining our operatic circus—welcome!

Remember, at The Florentine, we're not just about opera; we're about living life dramatically, with a twist of tongue firmly in cheek. Thank you for being part of our melodramatic family, and here's to another year of opera adventures!

PURPOSEFUL REFINEMENT

Earlier and more detailed production budgeting: we are now on an extended 18-month season planning cycle, building 24/25 programs. This shift allowed us to program TWO MULTI-COMPANY PRODUCTIONS INTO THAT SEASON, WHICH IMPROVES OUR QUALITY AND REDUCES COSTS.

ENGAGE COMMUNITY

NEW! A SUMMER OPERA TOUR ADDRESSED A CHALLENGE: HOW TO OFFER IMPACTFUL, FREE COMMUNITY PERFORMANCES and measure impact by geography, interaction level, and feedback. Florentine Opera appeared in Lake Park, Washington Park, Summerfest and in Delafield this summer.

We streamlined our Community Circle purchasing system, making it easier for underrepresented audiences to participate, based on partner feedback.

WE WELCOMED 368 COMMUNITY MEMBERS

FROM 16 ORGANIZATIONS. Other Community Circle participants included school partners and attendees of Covers Student Night.

We've reinvented our donor benefit structure to focus on experiences and **GETTING CLOSER TO THE ARTISTS.**

Through audience-focused curation, we tested audience appetite with English language reductions of grand opera (*Cosí fan tutte:REMIX*) and a crossover experience (*Covers* with Immortal Girlfriend), to assess impact. AUDIENCE REVIEWS AVERAGING 4.8 indicate these are a great fit in our repertoire.

We're building additional on site opera experiences like at the Cooperage; 63% of those buyer accounts were new to file.

Cosí averaged 4.3 in audience surveys. Grand opera "classics with a twist" are inspiring a return to the theater, so we are staying the course while buffeted by dropping national opera sales. We sold 59% to goal, against a national opera average of 50-60% to goal, down from last year. Barber of Seville saw 36% new buyers, and 20% returning lapsed buyers.

STRENGTHEN TEAM

WE SUCCESSFULLY WELCOMED AND ONBOARDED 7 NEW TEAM MEMBERS!

The Florentine maintains a BALANCED BUDGET with multiple years' of cash reserves- which we are using strategically to sustain us through our complete recovery from Covid's impact. 23/24 TICKET ACCOUNTS INCLUDED 54% NEW TO FILE, A 10.4% INCREASE IN TICKETS SOLD, AND A 4% INCREASE IN TICKET REVENUE. THANKS TO YOUR GENEROSITY, DEVELOPMENT RAISED \$2.2M.

Schools on Stage featured PATHWAYS HIGH **SCHOOL ONSTAGE** in Barber of Seville! Over the course of the season, Pathways students also got a Shakespeare session with our Education Manager and General Director, and served as lightwalkers and director's assistants. We also welcomed a UWM intern to our stage management team on Roméo et Juliette. our COLLECTIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMS BENEFITED 77,792 STUDENTS THIS YEAR IN 150 SCHOOLS AND 34 ZIP CODES. With a set designed by Milwaukee artist Rosy Petri, the Baumgartner Studio Artists performed a shortened Barber of Seville all over Southeastern Wisconsin for 7,558 students in 35 live performances at 63 schools, plus 4 live streamed performances. We are deepening our relationship with some schools. Breaking opera down into its fundamental components, the Florentine guided Penfield's kids 3-12 and their families through costumes, singing, movement, art, and more.

197 designers, artists, technicians, singers and more worked on our productions this season. WE CELEBRATE STORIES FROM MANY PERSPECTIVES. THIS SEASON'S CREATIVE TEAMS INCLUDED 23% PEOPLE OF COLOR AND 48% WOMEN/NONBINARY.

Cathy Costantini's remarkable tenure as the outgoing Board President begins with profound gratitude. Her leadership has steered the organization through challenges and triumphs, embracing its history as her inspiration and compass.

Today, her commitment to The Florentine Opera's mission remains steadfast for over seventeen years in her many leadership roles. She will tell you, however, her greatest love story is shared with her husband Mario, three children, three grandchildren, and two black labrador dogs.

Cathy created non profit fund-raising events that continue to thrive with perhaps the most beloved outdoor event, Pasta & Puccini.

Cathy reflects upon her love for the Florentine Opera and when asked what are among her favorite things, she will tell you, 'I love that we've historically been able to share the immense joy of opera music with the broader Milwaukee community, What a gift! But most importantly, the extraordinary people whom Mario and I have met will remain close to us for the rest of our lives.'

that revealed the strength of a racehorse determined to cross any and all finish lines to realize his dreams. Bela survived as a young boy, escaping from Hungary. Upon receiving a student visa in 1953 he was able to continue his studies in the United States and arrived in the United States on the day President Eisenhower was inaugurated. He continued his graduate studies in theology and was ordained to the Catholic priesthood in 1954. Bela's expertise in the field of the clinical treatment of alcoholism and other addictions was recognized nationally and internationally. Along with founding De Paul Hospital for those in recovery from addiction, he was a board member of the American College of Addiction Treatment Administrators and Alcohol and Drug Abuse

Problems of North America. As a commitment to the Florentine Opera Company, Bela and his wife Julie established an endowment for high school students to be able to attend the opera. He and Julie established an endowment at St. John's to bring the Florentine Opera Company to perform for its residents providing exceptional concerts. As a bastion of the Florentine Opera Club, Bela truly found refuge in opera and remained a passtionate audience member throughout his life.



museums, zoo, ballet and more, served as president of the Milwaukee Florentine Opera Club. She shared her life with her husband, COL. RALPHN. OLSEN, M.D. who would follow her posthumously days later. After earning her B.S. in education in 1954, she joined the U.S. Army Medical Specialist Corps, training in occupational therapy and serving Korean war veterans. As a 1st Lieutenant, she earned her M.A. in speech pathology at the University of Denver. While stationed at Fitzsimons Army Hospital in Denver, she met Captain Ralph Olsen, M.D. The two wed July 4, 1959 on Governor's Island, Manhattan, then moved to Orléans, France, where Ralph was stationed as chief of pediatrics at the U.S. Army Hospital and Eugenie taught

French to American children on base. After their first child was born, they moved to Elm Grove, Wisconsin. Their daughter, Wendy Olsen asked that gifts be made to the Florentine Opera in their honor. Both were avid sailors in addition to being lifelong opera lovers.
